FAMILY INFLUENCE Nehemiah 9:34-38

Our family of origin has had an influence on who we are today. Some of us want to pretend that our family was, or is, nearly perfect. Others of us may tend to avoid responsibility for our actions by blaming our family. Whatever the case, when we think about our own life, we also need to deal with our family and the effects its members have had on who we are today.

We are told that the returned Jewish exiles "confessed their own sins and the sins of their ancestors" (Nehemiah 9:2). They blamed their ancestors for their captivity and the difficult situation they were facing. They said, "[Our ancestors] refused to turn from their wickedness. So now today we are slaves in the land of plenty that you gave our ancestors for their enjoyment!... We serve [conquering kings] at their pleasure, and we are in great misery" (Nehemiah 9:35-37).

It's all right to admit the truth about what brought us into bondage. This might very well involve the wrongs committed by our parents and other family members. It's perfectly all right to express our anger and regret over what has been done to us. We have a right to hold others accountable and grieve over the negative effects their actions have had on our lives. That is all part of the real picture. It's not all right, however, to use this as an excuse for our wrong choices or for staying in bondage. Our relatives may be partly responsible for bringing us to this point, but we are responsible for moving on to a better place for ourselves and our family.

## **INSIGHTS FROM THE MINISTRY OF NEHEMIAH**

Great affliction and reproach! Ruins and wreckage! In Nehemiah 1:1-4 we see a situation that demanded rebuilding and recovery. When Nehemiah heard of the circumstances in Jerusalem, he was immediately touched. He wanted to do something about it. As we take inventory of our own life, we must take careful note of what areas need specific work. Rebuilding cannot take place until we know where to begin. In Nehemiah 2:17-18 Nehemiah performed a ministry of encouragement. He was completely honest about the people's problems; he didn't deny or underestimate their needs. Then he reminded them of God's powerful hand and challenged them to get on with the work. We all need a Nehemiah in our lives - someone who will honestly tell us what needs fixing and who will then stick close to help us complete the task. How do we handle ridicule and disdain? In Nehemiah 4:4-9 Nehemiah offers us a magnificent example. In such times, it is essential that we seek God and keep on guard. Nehemiah countered ridicule with prayer. Not only did he pray, but he also set a twenty-four-hour watch, guarding against an attack day and night. While It is important to pray to God for help with our lives, we must also be on the lookout for physical attacks from our enemies. Prayer must be balanced with action. One person can't do everything. In Nehemiah 4:14-18 Nehemiah recognized this and divided the tasks of defense and construction. This illustrates the truth that exterior attacks don't disappear just because we are busy focusing on our spiritual interior. We need to be prepared for attacks from external enemies who will try to take advantage of our busyness. This is especially true in recovery.

#### INSIGHTS FROM THE MINISTRY OF EZRA

It is imperative to remember that the Bible contains the directions and resources for rebuilding broken lives. While we may obtain physical recovery, it is also necessary to recover spiritually through salvation by belief in Jesus Christ. God is the foundation on which we must build our new lives.

## REMOVING RUBBLE Nehemiah 4:10

Rubble can be very disheartening in itself. With every remodeling project, trash accumulates. This is true not only for physical rebuilding but for emotional and spiritual recovery as well. The garbage was getting in the way of the workmen, and they were discouraged by it. We may experience the same discouragement as some of the unresolved emotional garbage from the past still remains. We must recognize the garbage, resolve the problem, and then remove the rubble so we can continue on the path to recovery.

them as well.


