Unfinished Business Philemon 1:13-16

Sometimes we need to complete unfinished business before we can move forward toward new opportunities in life. Some of us may have left trails of broken laws and relationships-things we need to address before moving on. Our new life does not excuse us from past obligations. While the apostle Paul was in prison, he led a runaway slave named Onesimus to a new life in Christ. Then Paul sent him back to his master, even though Onesimus faced possible death for his offense. Since his master was a friend of Paul's and a Christian brother, they hoped that Philemon would forgive him.

Onesimus carried a letter from Paul to his master, which read: "I wanted to keep [Onesimus] here with me. . . . But I didn't want to do anything without your consent. . . . It seems you lost Onesimus for a little while so that you could have him back forever. He is no longer like a slave to you. He is more than a slave, for he is a beloved brother.... If he has wronged you in any way or owes you anything, charge it to me" (Philemon 1:13-16, 18).

Before we can move ahead to a better future, we must face the unfinished business of the past. This includes offering to pay back what we owe, coming clean before the law, and going back to the people from whom we ran away. We can't assume forgiveness from people, although we can hope for it. In some cases we may be surprised to find pardon and release from the bondage of our past.

Prove our Love Philemon 1:3-9

Before bringing up the problem of the runaway Onesimus, Paul established his lines of communication with Philemon. The apostle showed an appreciation for Philemon and a real concern for his family. Paul's example can help us in our spiritual growth. Sometimes we must confront others about their dependencies or deal with another touchy problem. As we face confrontation, we need to make sure we value the people involved and take the time to establish strong lines of communication. If we jump in too soon, they may feel that we are just trying to hurt them. If we prove our love beforehand, however, they will be more receptive to what we say.

1. Restitution Philemon 1:10-13

Onesimus had been reconciled to God and had experienced God's forgiveness. But the fact that God had forgiven him did not exempt him from the consequences of his earlier actions. He still had to return to Philemon to make amends for his wrongs. Restitution is hard. Our actions have painful consequences; they hurt other people. Even after we have been reconciled to God, we still need to make amends to the people we have wronged. We can be sure that God will stand with us in the process. Onesimus returned to his master carrying this letter from Paul. There is no record of the outcome of Onesimus's return, but it is unlikely that this letter would have survived had Philemon not taken Paul's advice to forgive Onesimus.

2. Forgiveness Philemon 1:14-17

Both Onesimus and Philemon had a responsibility. Onesimus had to do what he could to make amends to Philemon; Philemon was responsible to accept the overtures of the repentant Onesimus. Old resentments had to be set aside, and Philemon was called upon to forgive and accept his repentant new brother in Christ. If we have wronged others, we need to take clear steps toward making amends. It is equally important, however, that we forgive someone who humbly seeks to make amends to us. Bearing grudges against others is destructive to the people we turn away; it also fills us with unresolved bitterness, hindering our progress in recovery.

3. Acceptance Philemon 1:18-21

With the phrase "charge it to me," Paul was asking Philemon to charge Onesimus's debt against Paul's account. Philemon was to welcome Onesimus back into his household as if Paul was the one returning. Paul intervened to arrest the progression of resentment and brokenness in this relationship. This is a beautiful illustration of what God does for us through Jesus Christ. God charges all our sins and failures to the account of Jesus Christ, who has paid the price through his death on the cross. Then God joyfully receives us into his family as his children (see 2 Corinthians 5:21).
