

Persistent Seeking Job 14:1-6

One thing that may make it hard to believe in God is that life often seems unfair to us. We didn't ask to be born into a dysfunctional family! We didn't have any say over the abuses and injustices we have suffered! We didn't choose our predisposition toward addiction. And yet we are held accountable for things we can't control on our own. This makes it hard to initially turn to God as the Power to restore our sanity. He seems unreasonable in his demands.

Job understood these feelings. In the midst of his suffering he said, "How frail is humanity! How short is life, how full of trouble! We blossom like a flower and then wither. Like a passing shadow, we quickly disappear. Must you keep an eye on such a frail creature and demand an accounting from me? Who can bring purity out of an impure person?" (Job 14:1-4). These are good questions-ones that most of us have asked in one form or another. Job persisted in his questioning because deep inside he believed God to be good and fair, even though life wasn't. He was honest with his emotions and questions, but he never stopped seeking God.

There is a good answer to the question Job posed, one that will satisfy both our heart and our mind. It will be found, how- ever, only by those who are willing to work through the pain and unfairness of life and still seek God. Those who seek him will find him. In God's loving arms, they will also find the answers they seek.

Focus on the Future Job 14:1-12

We are very fortunate to live after the time of Jesus Christ. We have seen grace demonstrated firsthand, and we have experienced the power of the risen Christ in our lives. Job understood much, but he couldn't quite grasp the idea of eternal life. Our days in the flesh are both numbered and final, and this disturbed Job. Our hope in a future life with Christ should make our troubles here on earth more bearable. We can know with certainty that our sufferings here are not permanent.

Dealing with Unfairness:

We live in a world filled with injustice and unfairness. The Bible recognizes this hard fact. Joseph suffered unfairly at the hands of his brothers and Potiphar's wife. David suffered unjustly for many years at the hands of King Saul. And, through no fault of his own, Job lost his possessions, his family, and his health. Job wondered why God was allowing him to suffer, but he never got a clear answer. He did, however, through his struggles come to know God in a new and deeper way. Even though we face unfairness in our world, we can still use those opportunities to learn more about trusting God.

Honesty with Our Emotions:

In the book of Job we discover that it is all right to cry, to doubt, to fear, to question, to need, and to wrestle with the very essence of our existence. As our hearts cry out against injustice and pain, the book of Job reassures us of the importance of being honest with God. When we are angry, we should tell him. When we are afraid, we should reach out to him. God understands our strong feelings. He is never put off or threatened by our anger. In fact, God longs for us to be open and honest with him. He wants to participate even in the darkest parts of our lives. Only then will we be able to come to him with our whole heart. Only then will he be able to bring us the healing and hope he longs to give.

The Importance of Trust:

When our lives are going smoothly, trust is easy. The tests of trust always come when our lives stop making sense. Job's attitude is a very real example of how trust needs to work in our lives. Everything job enjoyed had been stripped away for no reason that he could discover or understand. In spite of this, Job never gave up on God. He never placed hope in his experience, his wisdom, his friends, or his wealth. His trust was in God, even though he couldn't understand everything he was going through. God alone is sufficient to help us deal with the ambiguities in life. We can trust in him.
